Abstract: The University Buildings and Grounds Collection contains booklets, programs, correspondence, proposals, contracts, and blueprints regarding the construction, renovation, and maintenance of Southeast Missouri State University campus buildings. The materials within the collection pertain only to the campus buildings themselves and not the institutions housed within them.

Historical Note: Southeast Missouri State University opened in 1873 as the Southeast Missouri Normal School, initially encompassing only one building on campus. The institution later evolved into a college and then a university, which currently possesses around 30 main buildings, as well as numerous smaller buildings on and off campus. Only the main buildings are listed in the following note, including several that are no longer standing. The notes on individual buildings are listed in chronological order of construction or university acquisition. More information can be found using the University's online Building Index.

The **Normal School Building** was completed in 1875, on the site of a former Civil War fortification, Fort B, and is the site of present-day Academic Hall. It was the school's first building and cost around \$39,000 to build. It was designed in the French Second Empire style by Charles B. Clark of St. Louis, and stood three stories high, topped with multiple turrets. Throughout its existence, it remained the only school building of the college and housed classrooms, offices, and storage. In 1883 the auditorium was enlarged and two wings were added to the building in 1895. Just as construction was beginning on what would become Carnahan Hall, the Normal School Building burned down the night of April 7, 1902.

Carnahan Hall was designed in the neoclassical style by Jerome B. Legg of St. Louis and completed in 1902. It was initially built as the Science Building, and later became the Social Science Building. A chapel was once housed inside it and was used for daily prayer. The Missouri state seal is in cast bronze relief above the front entrances. It is the oldest standing building on campus and underwent a major renovation between 1994 and 1998. During the renovation the entire interior was removed from the masonry shell, and rebuilt with state of the art technology without diminishing the historic fabric of the building's exterior. Upon completion of the project, the building was rededicated Carnahan Hall in honor of longtime Southeast Missouri congressman and U.S. ambassador A.S.J. Carnahan of Ellsinore MO.

The **Foreign Languages Building**, also known as the **Art Building**, and the Agriculture Building, was built between 1902 and 1904 and designed in the neoclassical style by Jerome B. Legg of St. Louis. Built as its companion, it is identical to Carnahan Hall except for the pair of small towers that were added later for dramatic effect. It originally served as the Training School.

Academic Hall was built between 1903 and 1906 on the site of the former Normal School Building. It was designed by Jerome B. Legg in the neoclassical style on a monumental scale, capped with a massive copper sheathed dome topped with an acorn, representing the growth of higher education in Missouri. It was built of limestone from a local quarry. From 2012-2013, the building underwent a massive renovation project. The second floor was historically restored, but the rest of the building was completely renovated. The copper exterior of the dome was also replaced, having been in use for over 100 years.

Albert and Leming Halls were completed in 1905 and 1906 respectively, and built to meet the growing demand for student housing close to campus. Albert Hall was an all-male dorm, and Leming an all-female dorm. At the time of completion these were the only dormitories on campus, and previously students had to rent housing or live with families in the town some distance from campus. No longer standing, these three story dorms were built of local limestone in the neoclassical style. Albert Hall was located where Dearmont Hall now stands, and Leming stood on the site of the current University Center. These halls were named for prominent members of the community who were instrumental in expanding the campus at the time.

The **Serena Building** was built between 1905 and 1907 in a design that resembles the Collegiate Gothic Style. Originally it was called the Manual Training Hall and housed the School of Manual Training. Its basement held the heating and power plant of the campus and was in use until a larger power plant was built behind it. It was later renamed the Industrial Arts Building and housed the Industrial Technology Department until the completion of Seabaugh Hall. The west and east wings were built in 1962 and 1983 respectively, and were designed in a modern style to intentionally contrast with the main building. In 1975, it was renamed after Dr. Joseph A. Serena, the eighth president of the university. Along with classrooms and offices for the university, it houses the Southeast Missouri Public Radio Studio, which broadcasts the KRCU radio station.

Rosemary Berkel Crisp Hall of Nursing was built from 1921 to 1923 with local limestone and designed in the neoclassical style by Study and Farrar of St. Louis. Its construction was delayed in 1922 because of flooding. It originally held the Training School, the University School, and the University High School until it was moved into the Mark F. Scully Building. The building was referred to as the 'Old Campus School' after the move. The building underwent a major renovation in 1987 and was rededicated in 1988 in honor of philanthropist, women's health activist, and long standing member of the Southeast Missouri State University foundation, Mrs. Rosemary Berkel Crisp. During the renovation, the U-shaped north side of the building was enclosed to house Dempster Auditorium. Crisp Hall currently houses the College of Health and Human Services and the Center for Health and Human Services that serves as a full time student clinic on campus.

Wildwood served as the Presidents house. In 1922, the university purchased a 124 acre tract of land to be used as a demonstration farm. On the land was found an abandoned structure which housed a two story wine cellar. In 1923, the building was renovated upon the foundations of the winery. It has been updated, remodeled, and undergone major repairs several times over its lifetime. Currently it is not used as the President's residence, but serves as lodging for special guests of the University.

Houck Field House was completed on March 15, 1927 to house the Physical Education Department. The field house contained locker rooms, indoor basketball and gymnastics stadium, as well as offices. The original Field House burnt down on February 17, 1948, but was subsequently rebuilt and expanded in 1951. The new building served as the main locker room, basketball stadium, and home of the

Southeast Missouri State University Athletics Department. Houck Field House and Houck Stadium are named for Louis Houck, an important and longtime member of the Board of Regents and local railroad entrepreneur.

Houck Stadium, built in 1930, is one of the oldest stadiums in Missouri. It's been renovated and updated numerous times and currently has seating for 10,000 spectators. It is built of native limestone quarried from the site. It is the home venue for Southeast Missouri State University football and soccer, and was for the Cape Central High School football team until 2011.

The **Honors House** is a two-story residential house located at 630 North Henderson Avenue. It was built in the first quarter of the 20th century and has served many purposes for the university. It was purchased by the University in 1952 and was originally used as the Home Management house. After this use, it was referred to as the Himmelberger House. Afterwards it housed the Student Development Center, then University Relations. Currently it is home to the Jane Stephens Honors Program offices and serves as the honors student center.

Kent Library was built in 1939 as Public Works Administration (PWA) project along with Cheney Hall. The original building was designed in the neoclassical style using limestone from a local site, keeping with the prominent style on campus. Its original design also included wide art glass on the outer windows. The building underwent a major renovation between 1965 and 1968 that expanded the building space considerably and wrapped the original structure in a modernist concrete screen. It houses the university's library, archives and associated facilities along with a student computer lab. Various offices have been housed in the facility over the years. The library is named after Sadie Kent, a longtime librarian and faculty member at the school. It was the first building on campus to be named after a woman.

Cheney Hall was built in 1939 as a Public Works Administration (PWA) project along with Kent Library. It was designed in the neoclassical style to match the aesthetic of the rest of campus and built of limestone from a local site. It is the oldest residence hall still standing on campus and is reserved for upperclassmen. The hall is named for Lucius H. Cheney, the University's first president.

Myers Hall is located directly behind Vandiver Hall, and is the only residence hall open all year. Built in 1948 as an all-male dorm, it was remodeled in 1989, and again in 2001. Myers Hall is now a co-ed residence hall serving upper classmen and international students. It is also used for students staying during the summer term, and those who cannot return home during breaks. It was named in honor of Dean Vest C. Myers, who served the university from 1933-1945.

Memorial Hall was built between 1948 and 1949 as a Student Union and Lounge. It was designed in the Prairie Style using locally quarried limestone. It was the home of the University Museum until it was moved to the Rosemary Berkel and Harry L. Crisp II

Museum at the River Campus. Memorial Hall was named by the Board of Regents in recognition of university alumni who served in the armed forces.

The **Power Plant** was built between 1948 and 1951 with additions in 1965 and 1972. Originally intended to be at the edge of the university ground and surrounded by trees, it now sits at the heart of campus. The plant has provided many services to the university over the years including electricity, hot water, radiant heat, and chilled air for air conditioned buildings. Currently, it only provides steam heat to most of the buildings on the main campus. The base of the plant has on its walls several large billboards used by student organizations to promote events.

Brandt Hall of Music was built between 1959 and 1961 and is named after J. Clyde Brandt, a longtime professor of music at the university. Originally intended as a science building, its purpose was converted to house the growing Music Department. It served this role until the recent addition of the River Campus that now houses all performing arts classes. Brandt now serves a number of roles, including office space, classrooms, practice rooms, and is the home of the SEMO Marching Band, the SEMO Music Academy and the NASA Educator Resource Center. Brandt Hall is built into the side of a hill overlooking the Marching Band practice grounds and built in an airy, delicate modernist style with walls of windows.

Dearmont Hall was built between 1957 and 1958 to replace the aging Albert Hall that stood on the site. It was named after Washington Strother Dearmont, the seventh president of the university. For many years it was called the Dearmont Quadrangle. Originally an all-female residence hall, it now has both male and female housing by floors. Dearmont Hall has its own private enclosed courtyard, and at one time had its own dining hall. The Department of Public Safety once had part of its offices in building. The kitchen facilities are currently used by the Hospitality Management program as a training lab.

Magill Hall of Science was built between 1958 and 1960 and houses the Natural Science Departments. It was named for Dr. Arthur Clay Magill, long time professor of Chemistry and a Chair of the Science Department. The building underwent a major renovation between 2012-2013 and a large addition was constructed on its north elevation.

Parker Hall, or the Parker Athletic and Physical Education Complex, was completed in 1960, and was renovated in 1994. An addition to the building was constructed between 1968 and 1969 and included an Olympic sized swimming pool, but it became too difficult to maintain and was removed in 2002. It is named after Dr. Walter Parker, the ninth President of the university.

Johnson Hall was built in 1963 and was originally called North Hall, or the North Hall of Science, and was eventually renamed B.F. Johnson Hall. An addition was completed in 1982 which also bore the name. The addition was made possible through the generous donation of Mary Johnson Tweedy, the daughter of B.F. Johnson. The building is named

for B.F. Johnson, who taught at the university for nearly 40 years and was a former Chair of the Math Department.

Grauel Building was completed in 1966 and was originally named the Language Arts Building. It housed classes and offices for the Departments of English, Speech and Theater. In 1975 it was renamed after Dr. H.O. Grauel, a long time English Professor responsible for the university's journalism program. At various times it has housed the facilities for the KRCU radio station and the Channel 10 TV station. Attached to the building is the 500 seat Rose Theater.

Towers Residence Halls were built between 1966 and 1968 to keep pace with the growing demand of student housing. Consisting of a complex of 4 towers, named after the cardinal directions, they were remodeled and updated in the mid-1990s. The Towers Complex also houses a dining hall that serves its residents and other students.

The **Scully Education Building** was built between 1968 and 1971 and was originally called the Education and Psychology Building. It was renamed in honor of Mark F. Scully, the tenth President of the University who was responsible for much of the university's expansion in the 1960s and '70s.

The **University Center** was built between 1973 and 1975 to meet the demands of the rapidly growing student population of the college. The University Center contains the Student Union, lounges, a dining hall, numerous administrative offices, a large ballroom, and the university bookstore. Originally it held a bowling alley, but it was removed to make space for a large bookstore. The dining hall has been renovated multiple times, most recently in 2012 which redesigned and expanded the dining area. At over 101,000 square feet, the University Center is almost four times the size of the original Student Union in Memorial Hall. It continues to evolve to meet the needs of students.

University Hall was the name the university gave to the old St. Francis Hospital building after it was purchased in 1976 to accommodate the growing number of students in need of housing. While serving as a dormitory, University Hall also housed, at differing points throughout its usage, the Department of Nursing, Elder Care Center and Child Study Center.

Pacific Hall was acquired by the university in 1980 and was originally an apartment building. For the university it has served many purposes. It was originally the Robert A. Dempster Hall of Business and housed the classrooms and offices for the Department of Business. It is now used by the Department of English primarily for office space.

Rhodes Hall of Science was built in 1983 and houses many classrooms and offices of the College of Science, Technology and Agriculture. It was named for Roger F. Rhodes a farmer and businessman from Gideon, Missouri, whose substantial donation made the building's construction possible.

Johnson Faculty Centre was purchased in 1987 as a Faculty Union, and houses the Faculty Senate Offices, as well as providing lodging for visiting guests, faculty, and dignitaries. The Faculty Center is named for B.F. Johnson, former chair of the Math Department for whom B.F. Johnson Hall is also named.

The **Show Me Center** was completed in January of 1987, and is jointly owned by SEMO and the city of Cape Girardeau. The Show Me Center is the primary multi-purpose building on campus, with seating for up to 7000 people. It is used for athletic events, conventions, concerts, commencement ceremonies, and other large events. Attached to the Show Me Center is the **Student Recreation Center - North** completed in 1987, and the **Student Aquatic Center**, completed in 2009.

The building located at **1401 North Sprigg Street** was built between 1979 and 1980 as the Migrant Children Services Building. Since then it has served as the university's alumni center and currently houses the Department of Public Safety.

Robert A. Dempster Hall was built in 1996 and houses classes and offices of the Donald L. Harrison College of Business. Dempster Hall is a state of the art building featuring satellite technology for distance learning as well as microcomputer labs and numerous classrooms and lecture halls all equipped with cutting edge technology. It also houses the 400 seat John and Betty Glenn Auditorium named for two SEMO Alumni and longtime friends of the University. The hall is named for Robert A. Dempster, a prominent Sikeston Missouri lawyer and longtime benefactor of the university.

Otto and Della Seabaugh Polytechnic Building was built between June 1999 and 2001. It housed classes of the former School of Polytechnic Sciences and includes high tech labs and state of the art classrooms for instruction in technical study. Designed by William B. Ittner Inc. of St. Louis, the building was named for Otto and Delia Seabaugh, university alumni whose generous donation made construction of the building possible.

Willard Duncan Vandiver Hall is a state of the art dormitory that was constructed in 2002 to keep pace with the growing student enrollment of the university. It is named for Willard Duncan Vandiver, the fifth President of the university.

On May 27, 1998 the University acquired the former St. Vincent's Seminary buildings and grounds overlooking the riverfront. This was made possible in huge part due to a generous donation by Mr. William Winford "B.W." Harrison, Mr. Harrison made the donation specifically for the acquisition on the condition that the main building and grounds would continue to be used for educational purposes. In 2007 a major renovation and construction project was completed and the new **River Campus** was opened. More information at <http://www.semo.edu/rivercampus/about/history.htm>

The **Seminary Building** was completed in 1835 and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The building houses the Robert F. and Gertrude L. Shuck Music Recital Hall and the Art Resource Center (ARC).

The **Cultural Arts Center**, completed in 2007, houses the Rosemary Berkel and Harry L. Crisp II Museum, the Donald C. Bedell Performance Hall, the Wendy Kurka Rust Flexible Theatre, the John and Betty Glenn Convocation Center, as well as classrooms, offices, studios, and workshops of the Earl and Margie Holland School of Visual and Performing Arts.

A **new residence hall** will be built on the River Campus across from the Seminary Building to form a quadrangular plaza. It is expected to be completed in the summer of 2014.

Henderson Hall was acquired in November of 2007 and after an extensive renovation was opened as a new residence hall with apartment style rooms. Reserved for sophomore, junior, and senior students, Henderson is located on Henderson Avenue, just across the street from the University Center.

Merrick Hall was completed in 2009 as a suite style residence hall. Its design is complementary to Vandiver Hall. It stands beside Houck stadium on former site of KRCU radio station. It sits just behind the main entrance to campus, producing an imposing first impression of the University.

New Hall is a residence hall adjacent to the Otto and Della Seabaugh Polytechnic Building whose construction began in 2012.

Scope and Content Note: Correspondence, programs, photographs, contracts, building plans pertaining to the buildings on the Southeast Missouri State University campus. The majority of the collection is on Cheney Hall, Kent Library, the Show-Me Center, and the University Center. The collection is organized into series and arranged by building. It is further broken into subseries arranged by topic and date.

Series I: Carnahan Hall

Includes building inventories, floor plans, maintenance and renovation projects and correspondence concerning the Carillon Chimes. Arranged chronologically.

Series V: Serena Hall

Materials include floor plans, building additions, and maintenance and renovation projects. Arranged chronologically.

Series X: Kent Library and Cheney Hall WPA Planning

Series includes materials pertaining to the original construction of Kent Library and Cheney Hall in 1938. Arranged chronologically.

Series XI: Kent Library

Plans, contracts, correspondence, and dedication programs pertaining to the building's original construction and subsequent remodels. Arranged chronologically.

Subseries 1: PWA Construction

Materials include utility specifications, property reports, and dedication programs concerning the original construction of Kent Library in 1938. Arranged chronologically.

Subseries 2: 1965 Addition

Materials include space utilization studies, mural plans, correspondence and a library survey pertaining to the library's 1965 addition and remodel. Arranged chronologically.

Subseries 3: 2004-2007 Remodel

Materials include photographs, space utilization studies, and press releases pertaining to Kent Library's 2004 to 2007 remodel. Arranged chronologically.

Series XII: Cheney Hall

Series includes plans, addendums, and contracts for the construction of Cheney Hall in 1938. Arranged chronologically.

Series XIII: Myers Hall

Materials include floor plans, building inventories, and maintenance and renovation projects. Arranged chronologically.

Series XIV: Memorial Hall

Materials include correspondence between the University President, Board of Regents, and architectural firms concerning the planning of Memorial Hall. Series also contains building inventories and maintenance and renovation projects. Arranged chronologically.

Series XV: Power Plant

Series includes materials pertaining to building surveys and maintenance and renovation projects. Arranged chronologically.

Series XVI: Brandt Hall of Music

Materials include elevator installation plans and a building usage study. Arranged chronologically.

Series XVII: Dearmont Hall

Materials include bond resolutions for the building's construction. Arranged chronologically.

Series XVIII: Magill Hall of Science

Materials include a study of building usage and maintenance and renovation projects. Arranged chronologically.

Series XIX: Parker Hall

Series includes a building usage study and maintenance and renovation projects. Arranged chronologically.

Series XX: Johnson Hall

Series includes speeches and programs from the building's dedication and records on the construction of an addition to the building. Arranged chronologically.

Series XXI: Grauel Building

Includes programs from the building's dedication, a building usage study and maintenance and renovation projects. Arranged chronologically.

Series XXII: Towers Complex

Series includes materials pertaining to maintenance and renovation projects. Arranged chronologically.

Series XXIII: Scully Education Building

Materials includes floor plans, dedication programs, a building usage study and materials pertaining to maintenance and renovation projects. Arranged chronologically.

Series XXIV: University Center

Materials include correspondence, floor plans, building sketches, construction bids, and dedication ephemera related to the construction and maintenance of the University Center. Arranged chronologically.

Series XXV: University Hall

Legal materials concerning Cape Motor Lodge, Inc. vs. the City of Cape Girardeau, Missouri. Arranged chronologically.

Subseries 4: Publicity and Presentations

Materials include press editorials, voter education guides, and dedication programs. Arranged chronologically.

Series XXX: 1401 North Sprigg Street

Series contains a floor plan and exterior sketch of the building. Arranged chronologically.

Series XXXI: Robert A. Dempster Hall

Series includes floor plans, building drawings, and materials concerning the dedication of the building. Arranged chronologically.

Series XXXII: Otto and Della Seabaugh Polytechnic Building

Series contains CAD renderings of the building. Arranged chronologically.

Series XXXIII: River Campus

Includes documents related to the design, renovation and construction of the River Campus complex and the Seminary Building. These materials include correspondence, drawings, budgets, and meeting minutes. Materials from ceremonies for the River Campus facilities are included.
